Context

- 2. What just immediately happened before Acts 28:30-31 in Luke's record (see Acts 28:11-28)? Summarized what already took place in Paul's ministry in Rome.

Observation

- 3. What do you learn about the main "characters" (Paul, Jesus the King, the Kingdom of God)? How does Luke describe them, not just here but throughout all of Acts?
 - a. What mission did Jesus send Paul on? (See Acts 9:15; 20:21-24; 22:15; 26:16-18, 23; 27:23-25)

b. In Acts 1:1 Luke writes, "1 In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, 2 until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commands through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen.". Only 11 verses cover the post-resurrection life of Jesus, up through his ascension. However, how could Acts be rightly understood or titled as *The Acts of the Lord Jesus*, rather than *The Acts of the Apostles*?

c. What is the Kingdom of God? How have you heard it defined?

Some people think the Kingdom is Heaven—where we go after death. Others believe it's the church —the people of God today. Some focus on ethics—like good deeds and social action. Others see it as God's rule—his power and authority. Some spiritualize the Kingdom to "God's rule in one's heart."

Patrick Schreiner proposes this definition: "The kingdom is the King's power over the King's people in the King's place." Graeme Goldsworthy proposes this definition: "God's people, in God's place, under God's rule." How are these definitions more comprehensive and helpful?

4. What are possible reasons why Luke doesn't finish Paul's story? If one theological purpose of Acts is to record the expansion of the Kingdom of God, through the power of the King sending the Holy Spirit (see Acts 1:3-8; 28:30-31), how does that explain this ending?

- 5. Is time, place, or context significant in the events that happen?
 - a. Paul was in prison for four years total. Two in Caesarea. Then two in Rome. Imagine what that was like? What did Paul do to stay on mission during those two years in Rome?
 - b. Rome: What the importance of "*proclaiming the kingdom of God and teaching about the Lord Jesus Christ with all boldness and without hindrance*" in the capital city?
 - c. What is the significance of Paul welcoming all who came to him?
- 6. What surprises you in this text?
- 7. What is the main point or theme in this closing summary of Acts?

- 9. What does this passage reveal about God's people that is, what do you learn from the life of Paul? How does a faithful minister expel his duties?
- 10. Summarize the meaning of this passage in one sentence in your own words:

11. How is your life similar or different from the realities of this passage?

12. Head: How does this passage challenge (or confirm) what I believe: what I understand about God, his world, and myself? Do I expect us to succeed in the mission of the church—to be and make disciples of Jesus? What defines my vision of success? What causes me to doubt?

13. Heart: Is there some attitude I need to change? How does this passage shape my desires and affections? Do I want the King more than the Kingdom blessings?

14. Hands: How does this passage exhort me to change the way I live? How am I engaged in declaring the King and his Kingdom from the whole counsel of God? What would bold witness look like in my life? How might "the fires of boldness" turn up a notch or two over the next month?
